



## Amazing Feat

The detailed planning of the project began in September 2000 after His Holiness Pramukh Swami Maharaj performed the Foundation Stone Laying Ceremony (Shilanyas Vidhi).

In tune with Vedic traditions, the foundation of the Mandir was specially designed without any metal or rebar. This makes it a unique foundation.

Splendid white limestone from Turkey was selected for the exterior of the Mandir along with beautiful Italian marble for the interior.

The stone and marble were quarried in Turkey and Italy respectively and shipped to India. Skillful Indian crafstmen intricately carved the stones with a God-given art that can never be performed by a machine. The carved stones were then shipped to Houston, where they were meticulously pieced together like a giant 3D jigsaw puzzle with modern accuracy of millimeters!

For the first time a monument of such exquisite craftsmanship is being built in the Southwest Region. It reveals the splendour of ancient Vedic architecture (shilpashastra) built to last more than a thousand years. Inspired by His Holiness Pramukh Swami Maharaj the Mandir is being built on the gift of time and labor of hundreds of volunteers.

Upon completion, we will witness something divine, something eternal in the form of a Mandir.


